Renewal of the Newcomb Family Marker at Oakridge Cemetery

Mr. Paul Field is currently working to restore the beauty and clarity of Mother Mary Newcomb's family monument. Mary Newcomb was an Effingham volunteer Civil War nurse who served with Grant's Army on the Western Front. All things tend toward entropy, and the passage of time has had a cumulative negative effect on the 19th century Newcomb monument. In addition, the recent rains promoted the rapid growth of mold. The restoration is incomplete, but considerable progress has been made. Mr. Field hopes to conclude his efforts later this year.


